Led Zeppelin virtually defined rock-god excess with drugs, groupies and one notorious shark. While Zep's wild ride is long over, the band's imitators occasionally manage to inspire debauchery themselves.

"There was a trapeze artist who made it onto our tour bus once," says Steph Paynes, guitarist for the all-female Zep cover band Lez Zeppelin, which plays the Circle Line Music Cruise on Friday night. "She set up a trapeze in the back and did a little act for us. It was very nice."

While Paynes is as coy about dirty details as Zep's Jimmy Page was in his heyday — she also won't reveal whether her band's name is to be taken literally — she does describe how Lez Zeppelin has become an object of worship for Zeppelin die-hards.

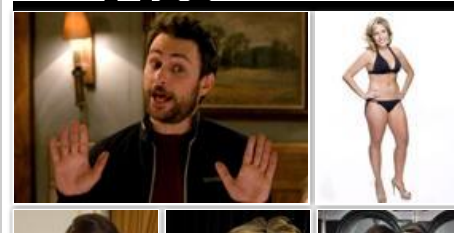

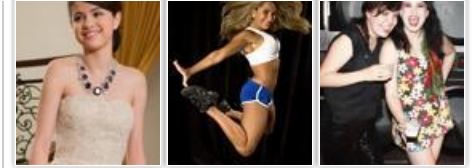
